PERMISSION TO PUBLISH, BROADCAST OR EXHIBIT STATEMENT

In most cases, permission to copy does not convey permission to publish, broadcast or exhibit the copy.

In order to use a copy for a purpose other than private study, the item must be in the public domain, or you must have permission of the copyright holder.

"Copyright in Canada generally exists for the life of the author plus 50 years following death. After that, the work becomes part of the public domain and anyone can use it. However, there are exceptions." ([Canadian Intellectual Property Office](#), 2015)

Please note that in most other countries, including the United States and the United Kingdom, copyright generally exists for the life of the author plus 70 years.
